#### **Introduction and Scientific Goals**

The Economic Geography Group of the Spanish Association of Geography (AGE), in collaboration with the Department of Geography. Prehistory, and Archaeology of the University of the Basque Country (UPV/EHU), is pleased to announce the hosting of the XI Jornadas de Geografía Económica-First Conference of Economic Geography, titled "Territorial and Productive Strategies in a Context of Global Change." The conference will take place at the Faculty of Arts located in the town of Vitoria-Gasteiz on November 14th and 15th, 2024. The aim is to create a space for high-quality scientific-academic exchange, exploring territorial and productive dynamics within the framework of contemporary global challenges.

This conference, marking its international debut, welcomes contributions in both English and Spanish languages. With an inclusive and multidisciplinary approach, the event boasts a scientific committee comprising distinguished experts in the field of Economic Geography and related disciplines.

The XI Jornadas de Geografía Económica-First Conference of Economic Geography will focus on studying the response of territories and their economic activities to the challenges posed by the







current context of geopolitical instability, climate crisis, questioning of globalization, and citizen unrest stemming from increased social and spatial inequality.

Within the European context, the green and digital transition, or the "double transition," emerges as the dominant geoeconomic strategy for adapting to global megatrends. However, it is true that European regions, cities, and rural areas exhibit very different transition paces and priorities, depending on their geographical framework and productive structure.

To provide a structured and contextual framework for academic discussions, the XI Jornadas de Geografía Económica-First Conference of Economic Geography will address three broad -but interrelated-research topics.

#### RESEARCH TOPIC 1: Energy, Digital, Ecological, and Food Transitions

The response to climate change in the energy field by the business fabric of regions has triggered a series of productive transformations. including diversification of energy sources, production relocation, investment in technology and human capital, among others, to meet the requirements of climate neutrality. The progressive electrification of transportation and the slow development of emerging energies, such as hydrogen, are shaping new geographies and infrastructures. Adapting economic activity to limited emissions is likely to involve a spatial reorganization of economic activity that accentuates socio-economic differences between regions and countries. The context of global political instability further complicates short and medium-term uncertainty, making creative regional and territorial strategies indispensable. On the other hand, the food transition, with the relocation of supply networks and chains, represents another significant challenge to move towards a sustainable production model. Finally, the circular spatial organization of semi-finished products for a cleaner final production from an energy perspective emerges as another pending challenge at the local and global levels in the era of financialized capitalism.

#### RESEARCH TOPIC 2: Territorial Response to the Transitions and their Challenges

At the regional level, various issues requiring differentiated public policies and private actions are identified. The challenge of a just transition for regions affected by the economic void left by the gradual abandonment of the exploitation of polluting energy sources in the European Union remains open. The "green" discontent in European rural areas, facing increasingly unbearable production costs, is eroding food sovereignty. Urban and metropolitan areas feel the geographical remodeling of value chains: reshoring and nearshoring. These urban and metropolitan areas continue to be better equipped for building smart territories: smart cities, smart villages, smart rural. A new challenge they face is that artificial intelligence (AI) adds the dilemma of positioning themselves as territories only consumers or generators of advancements in this new technological leap. The period 2020–2024, marked by the pandemic and changes in the spatial organization of economic activities, may reveal







trends already initiated. Additionally, advances in sustainable mobility of people and goods at different geographical scales are closely linked to energy transition, which has already begun to be implemented. Analyzing public policies to stimulate ecological and digital transition, as well as their territorial outcomes, emerges as another essential thematic area.

The communication, dissemination, and transfer of knowledge from Economic Geography to regions can be understood as a return on investment by regional, national, and European Union bodies in R&D in academic institutions. The transfer of accumulated knowledge obtained in research to regions is an essential task in advancing towards a more known and recognized discipline.
